1. Amgen Bicycle Race/Tour of California

Columbia College – President Smith

1. Entrepreneurship Grant

During the 6th Annual National Association for Community College Education (NACCE) Conference in Anaheim on January 5, Columbia College was one of 13 community colleges in the U.S. to receive a grant award of \$7,500 to further promote entrepreneurship education in Tuolumne and Calaveras Counties. Of 50 applications received, Columbia was the only California community college selected to present an “elevator proposal” – a three minute pitch – to demonstrate how the college is supporting self-employment education on campus. Business professor Ida Ponder did the presentation for the grant, which is funded by The Coleman Foundation and The John E. and Jeanne T. Hughes Charitable Foundation.

2. Columbia Wine Tasting

More than 50 statewide wineries are expected to be represented at the 33rd Annual Columbia Wine Tasting on Sunday, April 19, from 1-4 pm at Columbia State Historic Park.

3. Black History Month

Sylvia Alden Roberts, Tuolumne County author, historian and lecturer, will be the speaker for Black History Month on February 18 at 7 pm in the Dogwood Theater. C. Consent Agenda, Student Travel

1. Study in Northern Spain Program: Summer 2009

Columbia College is seeking Board approval of the study in Northern Spain program scheduled for two weeks beginning June 6, 2009, with an optional third week. Students will be based in Vitoria, Spain, and will study Spanish at their individually assessed skill level at the Zador Institute, an accredited school of Spanish as a foreign language. Students may receive Spanish and Humanities credit, depending on assessed level.

Spanish classes will be taught by certified Zador instructors, all native Spanish-speakers, for four hours per day, five days per week. Vonna Breeze-Martin, Columbia College Spanish instructor, will be the teacher-of-record, overseeing student progress. The Humanities component will be taught by adjunct instructor, Suzan Still, Ph.D. Students will stay with Spanish families selected by the Zador Institute. Program includes tuition, classes, home study, credits, ground transportation, airport transfer, excursions, lodging, meals, travel and accident insurance. The approximate cost will be \$2920 per person. Air expenses are the responsibility of each individual traveler.

1. Nomination - State Board of Governors Classified Employees Award

The California Community Colleges Board of Governors (BOG), the State Chancellor's Office, and the Foundation for California Community Colleges (FCCC) have created the First Annual Classified Employees Award. This award will recognize outstanding classified staff through the community college system. YCCD nominations were previously submitted to the Chancellor. One YCCD classified staff member will be submitted to the BOG and FCCC. The BOG and FCCC will honor up to six recipients at their May meeting.

2. Nomination – Innovation of the Year

The League for Innovation is a national organization dedicated to catalyzing the community college movement. Every year the League honors outstanding innovations which have been recognized by member institutions as Innovations of the Year. YCCD nominations were previously submitted to the Chancellor. One YCCD Innovation will be submitted to the League for Innovation for consideration for national recognition.

3. ☆Negotiations - YFA

Discussions with the Yosemite Faculty Association (YFA) regarding 2008-2009 contract negotiations are continuing. Based on this process, the attached Tentative Agreement on salary has been reached with YFA. Effective February 1, 2009, the increase will be applied to the certificated salary schedule.

Attached is Resolution 08/09-03 required by the State Department of Education for the Local Agreement for Child Development Services grant (#50-7134-00-8), previously approved on September 15, 2008. The purpose of the Resolution is to provide the State Department of Education a certified list of individuals who may sign for expenditures of funds.

Grant award funds in the amount of \$19,600 will be used by the Columbia College Child Care Center to repair and replace unsafe carpet and vinyl flooring in the Toddler and Preschool classrooms. Additional upgrades supported through this grant will include re-painting the Toddler and Preschool Building interiors and replacing outdated appliances.
