Presentation –
Program Review and
Resource Allocation

John Leamy, Academic Senate President, and Leslie Buckalew, Vice President of Student Learning at Columbia College, co-presented on Program Review and Resource Allocation. The presentation included a review of what constitutes a program, the purpose of program review, and how it integrates with college planning. Based on the college's recent accreditation recommendations 2, 5 and 6, Columbia College will seek to strengthen the process of effective resource allocation based on evaluating how allocation resources are positively impacting institutional goals. A newly developed program review response form was introduced along with a demonstration of improved data access to support program review.

Modesto Junior College President Jill Stearns reported on the decision-making document "*Engaging All Voices*." She reported it was the work of a participatory group for over 8 months, laying out a definition of good faith and collegial consultation. She reported her role in the document was putting forth a different participatory structure with more councils, more opportunity for students, staff, and administrators in which all college issues are discussed. The standards require that kind of a forum and MJC must provide a venue where there is cross communication from all groups. President Stearns reported she removed the specific documentation regarding how each constituency group works, that the participatory structure does not define how any constituent group functions, and it does not belong in this particular document.

President Stearns called the Board's attention to the following:

Swim Coach Receives Award Swim Coach Kurt Olson has received the Kerry O'Brien Coaching Award from the United States Masters Swimming Organization. The award recognizes coaches throughout the United States who are building membership in communities and who embody the passion, dedication, and heart that Master Swimming coaches bring to the pool deck. Olson was one of seven recipients named for the award at the United States Aquatics Sports Convention September 16 in Greensboro, N.C.

Professor Bill Anelli Reports on Sabbatical During his sabbatical leave, Professor Bill Anelli wrote his recently published peer-review paper, "The Peer-Review Certification Label: A Shortcut to Assessing Expertise and Consensus by the Necessarily Uninformed." On September 26, Professor Anelli gave a talk titled "When Experts Disagree: Whom Should I Trust?" at MJC's Science Colloquium - Science That Matters lecture series. Professor Anelli explored a checklist of critical questions used to distinguish legitimate from illegitimate experts in cases where opposing experts possess similar marks of academic quality such as degree, title, and institutional affiliation.

Columbia College Accreditation Follow-Up Report

Columbia College was informed by the Accreditation Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, via letter dated February 1, 2012, that its accreditation had been reaffirmed per the October 2011 visit, with a requirement that the college complete a Follow-Up Report and submit it to the ACCJC by October 15, 2012. It was also noted that the report would be followed by a visit from Commission representatives.

The Follow-Up Report was discussed in many venues such as College Council and Academic Senate meetings, as well as posted to the college's website for open viewing. The report was written over the summer months with input and review by committees assigned to each District and College recommendation. These committees were comprised of members from each constituent group with input and review by District staff, where appropriate. As directed by the Commission, the report addresses District recommendations 1 through 4 and College recommendations 1 through 7, excluding College recommendation 3. The Follow-Up Report was previously sent to the Board.

Trustee Rojas made a motion that the Board of Trustees receives the 2012 Columbia College Accreditation Follow-Up Report and directs staff to forward the report to the Accreditation Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC). The motion was seconded by Trustee Martin.

The motion carried with a vote of 6-0. (Trustee Hallinan was out of the room at the time of this vote).

Mission Statement

Follow-Up Report

Modesto Junior College received notice from the Accreditation Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges on February 1, 2012, of their action based on evaluation and recommendations from a site visit October 24 through 27, 2011. The Commission imposed Probation on the College for deficiencies addressed in College recommendations 1, 3, 4, 5, and 8. Also the College had an additional requirement to complete a Follow-Up Report and submit it to the ACCJC by October 15, 2012. The report will be followed by a visit from Commission representatives now scheduled October 31 and November 1, 2012. The Follow-Up Report was discussed in two scheduled collegewide meetings inviting all constituents for input and clarification of responses. The report has been vetted in many campus committees and councils. The report was written

over the summer months with input and review by committees assigned to each District and College recommendation. These committees were assigned responsibilities to address each response and provide documentation to affirm compliance with accreditation eligibility requirements. The report addresses District recommendations 1 through 4, and College recommendations 1 through 8; excluding College recommendation 3 and 4.

The Chair read aloud the recommendation that the Board of Trustees receives the 2012 Modesto Junior College Accreditation Follow-Up Report and direct staff to forward the report to the Accreditation Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC).

Trustee DeMartini made a motion that the Board of Trustees receives the 2012 Modesto Junior College Accreditation Follow-Up Report and direct staff to forward the report to the Accreditation Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC). The motion was seconded by Trustee Martin.
