1. Scholarships to Columbia College Students

Scholarships in the amount of \$85,329 were awarded to 80 Columbia College students at the annual Scholarships and Awards Celebration on April 21, 2005. Blythe Lee was named the Student of the Year, which carried with it the College's top Faculty Scholarship of \$3,000. The other two top Faculty Scholarship winners were Jason White (\$2,000) and Nalatie Alpers (\$1,000).

2. New Phi Theta Kappa Chapter

Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society of two-year colleges, has established a local chapter at Columbia College. George Melendrez, coordinator/instructor of the College's Fire Science Program, has been named as the faculty advisor.

3. MJC President to Host Superintendents and High School Principals

Area school superintendents and high school principals have been invited to a breakfast meeting on Tuesday, May 17, 2005, at 7:30 a.m. in the East Campus Student Lounge to discuss MJC programs and initiatives, current educational issues and to explore ways in which we can work with our educational partners to improve student success. 4. MJC Honor Society Students and Advisors Recognized at State Convention

Three MJC students were presented with scholarships from Alpha Gamma Sigma (AGS), a statewide community college honor society, during the State AGS Convention held April 8-10, 2005 in Ventura, California. Elizabeth Campbell, Chapter President, Spring Semester, was awarded one of five Mantovani Scholarships - the State's highest award. Lorraine Ramirez, student speaker at MJC's Commencement Ceremony and AGS Chapter President, Fall Semester, earned one of four Bell Scholarships, the highest service award. Margaret Middleton was awarded the Kathleen Loly Academic Scholarship for her high GPA and the depth, breadth and difficulty level of her academic record. Jacqueline Faris, faculty advisor was awarded AGS Outstanding Advisor, elected State AGS Treasurer and member of the Board of Trustees. John Otte, adjunct anthropology instructor and co-advisor of AGS, was elected President of AGS State Executive Board and member of the Board of Trustees.

5. MJC Honors Admiral Richard Ustick as 2005 Distinguished Alumnus

Admiral Richard C. Ustick, MJC Class of 1953, was honored as Distinguished Alumnus for 2005 during the Commencement Ceremony. He was commissioned as an Ensign in the U.S. Navy in 1956, served as Director of Professional Development at the U.S. Naval Academy, was promoted to Admiral rank, served as Commander, U.S. Naval Forces in Central and South America and was Chief of Staff in Panama. After his retirement from the Navy in 1990, Admiral Ustick directed Spring Garden College of Philadelphia as Vice President and then President. In 1994, he was selected as President of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge, PA. He retired from this, his third career, at the end of 1999.

6. Nominations Sought for Purdy Awards

Nominations are now open for MJC's 2005 Purdy Awards for Excellence in Education. These prestigious awards, funded through a bequest from the Raymond and Carolyn Purdy Estate, honor one faculty member and one classified or management staff member annually. Honorees will be announced at the Fall Institute Day in August. All permanent MJC faculty, classified and management staff members are eligible to be nominated for this award. Nomination forms are available in the MJC Foundation Office. Deadline for nomination submission to the MJC Foundation Office is June 1, 2005.

7. MJC Veterinary Technician Certificate Program

The Central Valley has a need for more Registered Veterinary Technicians and MJC's Veterinary Technician Certificate Program is working to help meet this demand. The one year program, which began in November of 2004, is comprised of seven classes totaling 17 units and prepares students to take the Registered Veterinary Technician (RVT) state exam. The program has approximately 100 students currently enrolled and are hoping to expand the Fall 2005 enrollment. There are no prerequisites to register for the Veterinary Technician Program. The program is associated with the Northern San Joaquin Veterinary Medical Association (NSJVMA). Students are placed in participating area veterinary clinics through a paid internship program to gain hands-on experience for the state exam. The Veterinary Technician Program is supported by a State Chancellor's Office Economic Development grant in the amount of \$159,414.00 per year for two years.

2. Bond Update

- Citizens Oversight Committee – The first orientation meeting was held on May 10, 2005 at 6:00 p.m. in the YCCD Board Chambers, 2201 Blue Gum Avenue, Modesto.

- Funding – YCCD completed its first sale of Measure E bonds, \$94.445 million, on April 19, 2005. The bonds have a cumulative interest rate charge to taxpayers of under 4.5%, which according to Citigroup is a favorable interest rate.
- Construction – District staff and trustees have met with developers, land owners, city and county officials regarding potential sites for Outreach Centers in Oakdale, Angels Camp and on the West Side (Patterson, Newman).

D. Presentations/Updates

3. State and Local Budget Update

There has been little new significant information about the State budget since the February 9, 2005, Board meeting. The Governor's May Budget Revise will be released on May 15, 2005. Staff will present the latest available State budget information at the June 8, 2005, Board meeting along with the District's 2005-2006 Tentative Budget.

Locally, both colleges continue to address FTES growth. Modesto Junior College is approximately 500 FTES short of their base and over 900 short to reach their 3% growth target for this year. MJC plans to borrow FTES from the Summer Term to make up the 500 FTES decline, which represents 3.36% of their base FTES. For the 2005-2006 fiscal year, MJC must first make up the borrowed 500 FTES before generating any new growth. This will be a considerable challenge for the College. Columbia College is short of their 3% growth target; however, it appears that they will make their base. Columbia College plans to borrow summer FTES to reach their growth target if they do not grow as planned.

The Modesto Junior College Administration continues to address a \$1.2 million cost overrun on their part-time overload budget. They believe the deficit will be reduced to \$500,000 by fiscal year end. The District faces major budget uncertainties and challenges for the 2005-2006 fiscal year. A more thorough and descriptive fiscal analysis will accompany the 2005-2006 Tentative Budget to be presented at the June 8, 2005 Board meeting.

4. MJC Nursing Program Access Effort

The Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program at MJC is working hard to meet the needs of the community within the constraints of the local health service agencies. The program has committed to graduate 80 Nurses each Fall and Spring semester. This is an increase from 60 each semester. The DET/Emanuel LVN program has provided fully qualified students who upgrade from their LVN programs and positions into the ADN program in the third semester. This is an additional positive outcome of the Emanuel program. The nursing program is highly impacted at first semester. The LVN to RN upgrade allows highly qualified and experienced students to access the program in spite of limited openings.

The biggest obstacle to increasing the number of nurses in Stanislaus County is the limited number of clinical placements in acute care hospitals, and qualified and willing preceptors for the final semester of the program. We are working diligently with the Hospital Consortium to solve this shortage and are looking for funding sources to provide a database of available clinical placements. In addition, we look forward to a new state-of-the-art building in which to serve increasing numbers of nursing students.

4. Child Care Center – Agency Annual Report

The Annual Report is a requirement of the Child Care Center's grant funding from the California Department of Education, Child Development Division and is due each year on June 1st. Staff and families participated in compiling a comprehensive program review document. That document has previously been provided to the Board for review.

5. ☆Board Policy 5560 – 1st Reading

There exists a discrepancy between the cumulative GPA that triggers academic probation and the GPA that triggers academic dismissal after three consecutive semesters. Board Policy 5560 states that a student will be placed on academic probation if a student's average GPA falls below 2.0. The policy also states that a student with a cumulative GPA of less than 1.75 (for 3 consecutive semesters) is subject to dismissal. Because of this discrepancy a loophole is created that would allow a student to remain on academic probation indefinitely. Example: A student could have a cumulative GPA of 1.76 for three consecutive semesters (or longer) and never be subject to academic dismissal. A copy of the revised policy is attached.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees conduct a first reading of the proposed revision to Policy 5560.

6. Five-Year Construction Plan

Annually the Five-Year Construction Plan is updated for submission to the California Community College State Chancellor's Office. The plan is used to apply for state construction funding based upon eligibility in the areas of lecture, laboratory, library, AV/TV, and office space. Based upon the State's formula, districts with remaining space needs in these areas may submit proposals for funding. That document has previously been provided to the Board for review.

A Final Project Proposal for funding is being submitted for Columbia College for the Manzanita Building Modernization.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees receive the plan and approve it for submission to the California Community College's State Chancellor's Office per Board Policy 3600 – Capital Construction.
