Science (MAPS)
Symposium

Chancellor Williams invited everyone to the Modesto Area Partners in Science (MAPS) symposium entitled "ENERGY: Preparing for the Future," on Friday, September 17, 2 - 9 p.m., at Modesto Junior College. The series of timely presentations and discussions will focus on regional, national and international energy issues and resources. The keynote speaker will be David Goodstein, California Institute of Technology Vice Provost and physics professor, and author of "Out of Gas: The End of the Age of Oil." Afternoon presenters include Roland Winston, University of California at Merced professor, speaking on solar energy, Anthony Eggert, University of California at Davis professor, speaking on fuel cells and a hydrogen economy, and Phillip Duffy, a scientist with Livermore National Laboratory, speaking on global warming. Over 200 volunteers participated (students, staff, faculty, community members, and Habitat staff), in cleaning up, painting, planting and hauling off truckloads of refuse from Parkdale Avenue in the Riverdale neighborhood. The revitalization had a positive impact on 55 homes and yards, and countless lives, as the community came together in this combined effort. The Chancellor extended a special thank you to Judith Monast for leading this effort, and to the MJC Workforce Training Center for coordinating MJC's volunteers, to the MJC students and staff (and their family members) who participated, and to the MJC Foundation for providing sodas for all the volunteers.

CDF Firefighting Academy
Partners with Columbia
College

President Riggs reported that the important partnership Columbia College has with the California Department of Forestry continues. One of their joint efforts is the Tuolumne/Calaveras Unit Firefighting Academy which was conducted June 14-22. Forty

participants received training in wild land and structural fire control techniques to prepare them for the current fire season. Classes were held at the college and training exercises with actual fire control simulations took place at Modesto Reservoir and the Sierra Conservation Center in Jamestown.

Science Teaching Academy
and Network (STAN)

Chancellor Williams reported that Modesto Junior College, in partnership with the Stanislaus County Office of Education, has developed the Science Teaching Academy and Network (STAN). He introduced MJC Professor Emeritus Lynn Hansen, who is co-director of this project. Ms. Hansen made a PowerPoint presentation summarizing the highlights of this program. She explained that the program has been supported by funding from Improving Teacher Quality State Grants (No Child Left Behind). Ms. Hansen said the focus of the project has been to enrich the content knowledge of our regional 4th, 5th and 6th grade teachers in life, physical, and earth science and to increase their confidence as they are faced with teaching the new California State Science Standards. Trustees thanked Professor Hansen for her informative report and for her efforts in providing this resource.

Discussion Items

Local Community College
Repair and Overcrowding
Measure

Chancellor Williams reported that last year the Board of Trustees commissioned staff to update the YCCD Facilities Master Plan and identify the most critical facility needs of the District to ensure that the two primary goals of our community colleges are met -- preparing students to go on to four-year universities and providing job and career training.

After an 18-month process with campus and community participation, the Plan was adopted by the Board in February 2004 and revised in June 2004. Over \$600 million of future projects were identified to accommodate future growth and ensure program excellence at Modesto Junior College and Columbia College. At the June 9 Board meeting, staff presented a draft priority list to the Board for review, identifying \$326,174 million for the potential bond measure.

The next step for the Board is to decide if the Facilities Master Plan priority list should be implemented this year, by placing a Local Community College Repair and Overcrowding Measure on the November 2 ballot.

Mr. Robert Barna, the bond underwriter and investment banker, who has been working with the District for about a year, provided background information about himself. He explained that his specialization is school and community college general obligation bonds, their structuring, and determining how bonds are phased in over time and how those bonds relate to a tax rate. He reported that YCCD's assessed evaluation has been strong over the last several years and has almost doubled in the last 13 years. The \$326 million measure identified by YCCD, if placed on the ballot, would mean a tax of about \$19.70 per \$100,000 for the home owners in the community. Mr. Barna said the bonds would be issued over an eight to nine year period. He answered trustees' questions regarding how long the community would be repaying those bonds. He clarified that as the District's assessed evaluation increased, the tax could potentially decrease each year once all the bonds are issued.

Trustee Hallinan, pointed out that this measure would be a large one, and in such cases other community colleges have chosen to use co-financial managers. He asked that if the District chose to go with co-managers, would that affect Mr. Barna's participation in the process. Mr. Barna stated that would not deter him. However, he said he would like to speak with the Board further on that issue.

These students, staff, and community speakers described how the bond measure would provide hope for continued student success, excellence of programs, and up-to-date technology and facilities. They also stated that a bond measure on the ballot would give the voters the opportunity to show that they value the contributions our institutions make to the community. All the speakers urged trustees to place a bond measure on the November 2 ballot. They pledged to work hard to support its passage.

Dr. Stroud, Faculty Consultant to the Board of Trustees, echoed the comment voiced and also urged the Board to move ahead with the bond measure.

A letter from MJC Alum Bryan Justin Marks which expressed his experience as an MJC student and his strong support for a bond measure was read to the Board by a fellow student.

Chair Schrimp also read a letter submitted by Mr. Jim Poore, former MJC Foundation president and current Foundation member, stressing the financial need of the District and his strong support of the bond.

Trustees said they were very encouraged by the support expressed at this meeting. They also cautioned that placing a bond measure on the November ballot would require much work and would need everyone's support. Trustees pointed out that they had put together a package that will provide the funds needed to enhance educational opportunities for the constituents in our service area.

A motion was made by Trustee Rojas, seconded by Trustee Neumann, that the Board of Trustees adopt **Resolution No. 04-05/001**, ordering an election and establishing specifications of the election order for the Local Community College Repair and Overcrowding Measure for the November 2, 2004 ballot.

The motion carried with a vote of 6-0.

Chancellor Williams recognized Nick Stavrianoudakis for his lead in this effort and the combined efforts of the staff from both colleges and Central Services. Trustees thanked them all for their team efforts.

2004-2005 Appropriations
Limit

Chancellor Williams asked that the Appropriations Limit agenda item be addressed before the Board moves on to the Construction Plan item as Executive Vice Chancellor Scott needed to leave the meeting early.

The Executive Vice Chancellor reported that pursuant to direction provided by the Board of Trustees' action during the meeting of June 9, the report establishing the District's 2004-2005 appropriations limit was publicly posted and now must be adopted consistent with law. Ms. Scott said the report demonstrates how under funded the community college system is.

A motion was made by Trustee Hallinan, seconded by Trustee Neumann, that the Board of Trustees adopt the report establishing the District's 2004-2005 appropriations limit as required by law.

Five-Year Construction Plan

Maria Baker, Director of Facilities Planning and Operations, reported that annually districts update their Five-Year Construction Plan for submission to the California Community Colleges State Chancellor's Office. The plan is the tool used to apply for state construction funding based upon eligibility in the areas of lecture, laboratory, library, AV/TV, and office space. Based upon the State's formula, districts with remaining capacity in these areas may submit proposals for funding. Ms. Baker explained the order of the YCCD Plan and how state funding is made available based on space capacity/loads ratios. She said some of the data used for the report are enrollment statistics from the state, weekly contact hours forecast, existing space capacity, and projected staff increases. These figures then determine which projects are fundable and which may not be fundable by the state.

Ms. Baker said that initial project proposals for construction funding are being submitted for Columbia College for the Manzanita Building Modernization and at Modesto Junior College for the construction of a new Planetarium/Observatory at the East Campus and a West Campus Instruction Facility. Ms. Baker pointed out that funding for these projects will be contingent upon the passage of a new statewide bond.

A motion was made by Trustee DeMartini, seconded by Trustee Neumann, that the Board of Trustees receive the plan and approve it for submission to the California Community Colleges State Chancellor's Office.

The motion carried with a vote of 6-0.
